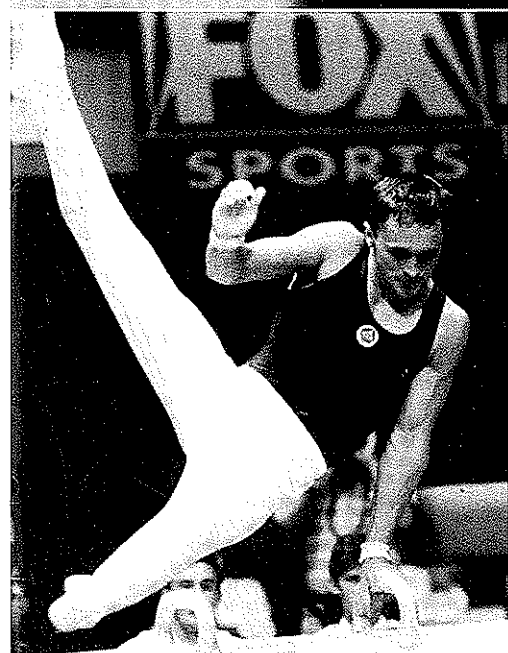
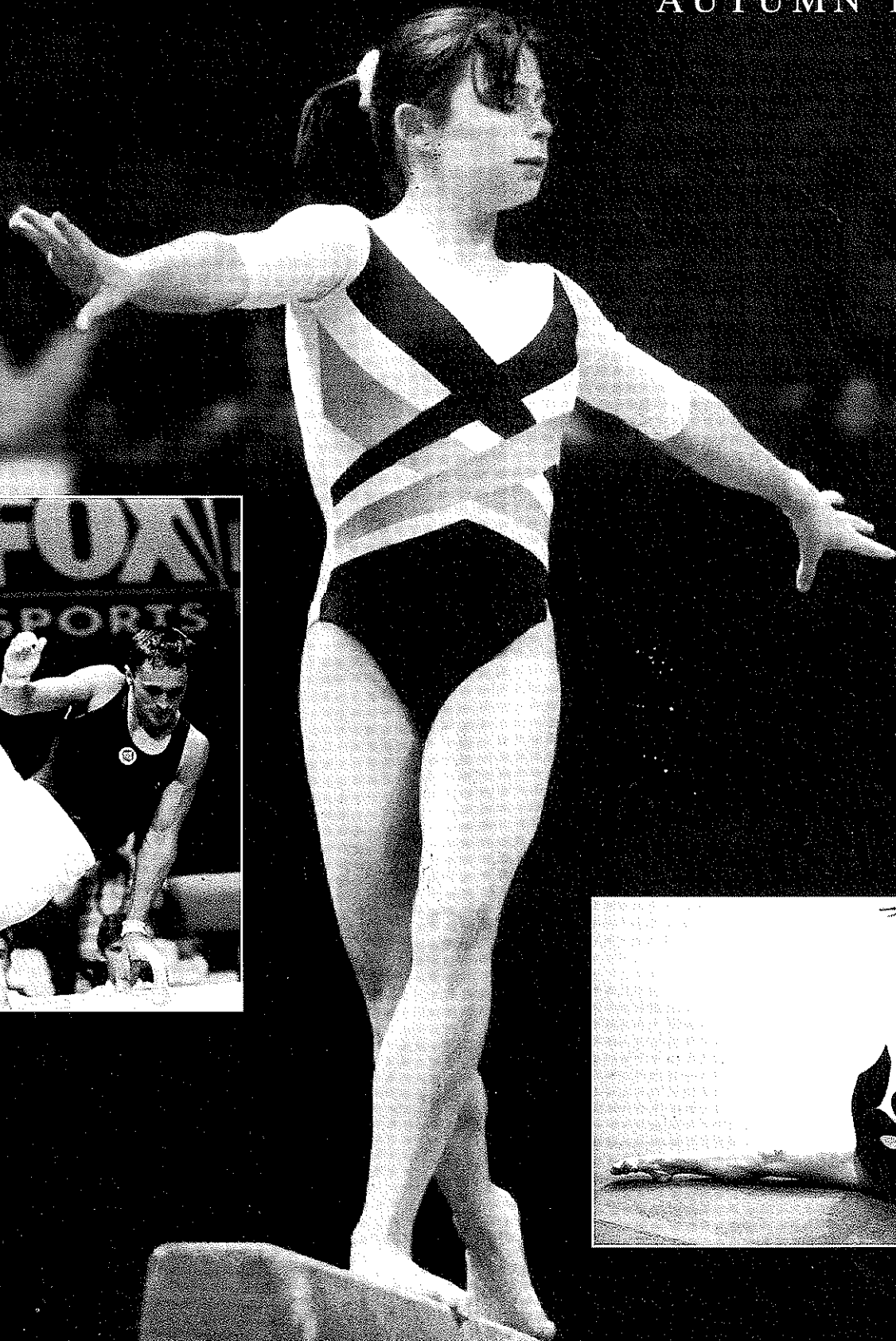


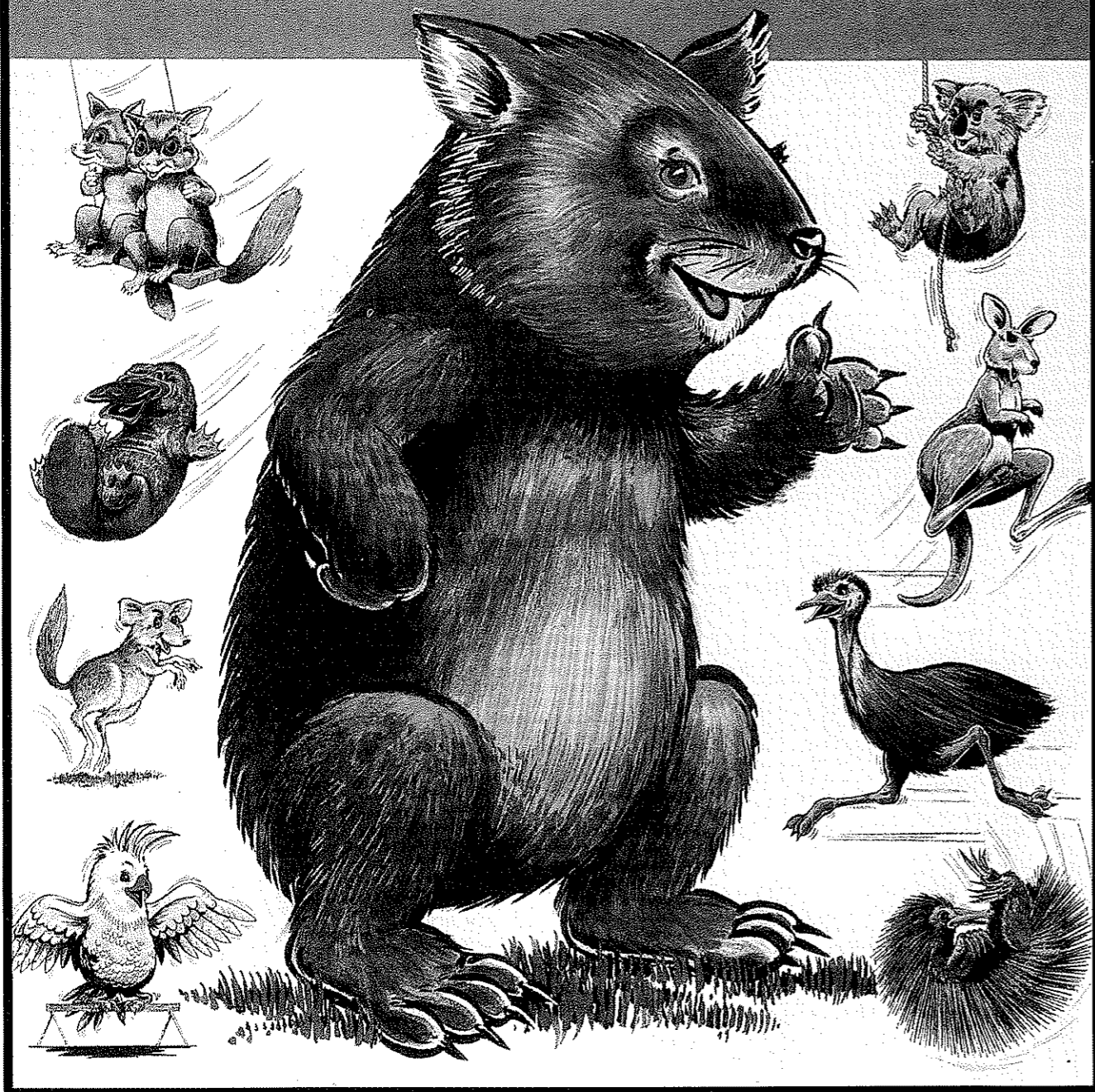

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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

As always, at the beginning of each year there is renewed enthusiasm to tackle the challenges that lie ahead. 1996 is no different and with the overlay of the Olympic Games it will prove to be very exciting.

Early in the new year a number of changes within the National Office have occurred which have given us the opportunity to evaluate and review our delivery of service to the community. It was with regret that we accepted the resignation of the Events Director, Jane Allen, who has made an enormous contribution to the sport of gymnastics in putting the events into specific categories and creating a department within the National Office who departed after the Australian Championships. She has

also presented many ideas in the area of merchandising and has tackled that area with enthusiasm and competence. Her concern for the general membership and their benefits also received support through assistance and ideas in this important area.

The National Office, long cognisant of its responsibility to provide services to the membership, has identified a position solely to look after membership data. Greg Jackson, who worked in that area as well as many others, will now take on the role of Administrative Services to assist in the training of the ACoRD programme, assist with events, and assist in the National Office with information technology.

There will also be a change in

the receptionist/secretary position as the current receptionist, Simone Amiet, takes up an opportunity to play softball in Canada. As a potential 2000 representative in that sport we applaud her initiative and wish her well.

We had anticipated that the 1996 year would be a year of consolidation and no new initiatives; however, with the signing of the Foxtel agreement and the increase in events, via the programming of Foxtel International Challenges and with the employment of new staff, we have a period of learning. Australian Gymnastics continues to thrive with its new opportunities and initiatives. 1996 will now be no exception to the past.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Another memorable year in the history of the Federation has passed with a major paradox in performance.

Our Rhythmic and Men's Teams at the World Championships performed better than ever before, 23rd and 16th respectively, qualifying one rhythmic gymnast, first since 1984 and two male gymnasts, best since 1984, to the Olympic Games. The fantastic success of our Sport Aerobics Team, at the First FIG World Championships handed us our first medal ever at FIG World Championships. See full report elsewhere in this Edition.

The paradox however was that our Women's Team, with more

financial and coaching support, slipped from 6th in the World to 12th, just qualifying by the slimmest of margins. That qualification was justice in a way for those striving to maintain our 1991 position, however there are serious questions to be answered if we want to be a force in Sydney in 2000. Our Atlanta results will be a litmus test for Government and Olympic funding for the next Olympiad. So, we have six months to improve on our Sabae performance.

There are cogent reasons why our Women's Team slipped so far and some of those are related to the Hayden Opie Inquiry which was finally, after eight months, tabled in

Parliament on the 29th November, 1995. This was the final outcome of what has become known as the "WAG Elite Issue" which has truly tested our Federation over the last Olympiad "to the tenth degree". It has also tested our sports structure through the democratic rights of dissenting minorities or individuals to the extreme.

For the second time the Presidency was challenged at the 1995 Annual General Meeting, over this issue because the President supported a National technical decision. Most would argue that this is his responsibility irrespective of his personal opinion.

The AGM was to have been the final test. The President survived by

the barest of margins through the good sense of Lance Otto, long serving Vice President, standing down, because there was insufficient support. What the AGM did reveal however was that our representational constituency is not appropriate when dealing with issues of a technical nature. Fortunately we have in place a Taskforce examining our structure as we move Towards 2001.

Another good outcome was that Murray Chessell was elected Vice President and he has achieved a great deal in appeasing those opposed to the WAG Elite National Plan. He initiated a Workshop 27th/28th October on the issue. The third such open forum and even though there was no change to the two differing philosophies, there was some consensus as to the outcomes, especially, "no forced relocation of any gymnast" and there would be "open" selection for any team.

It was generally agreed that we would keep the issue in house, because of the damage caused by the public debate.

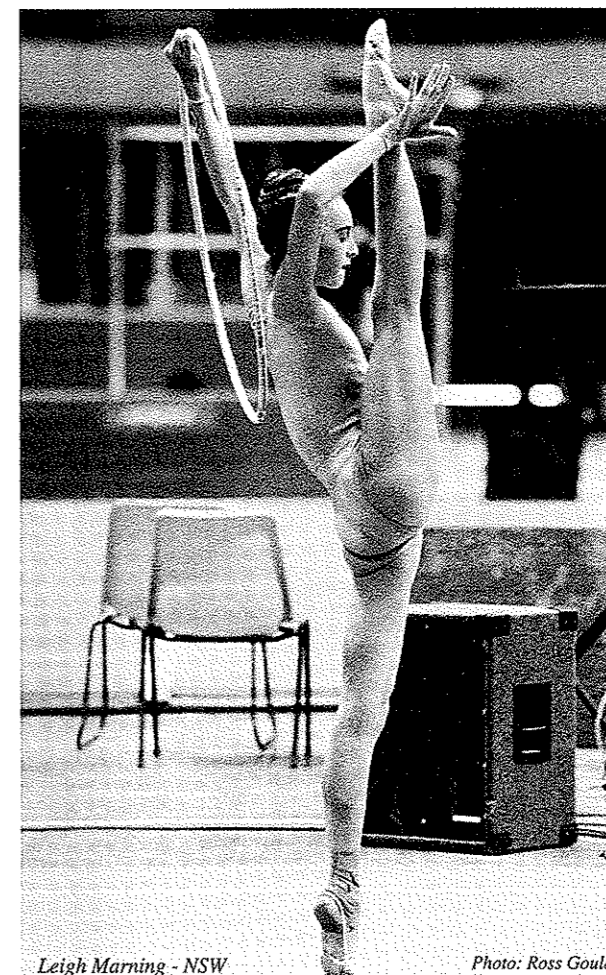
The Federations' Board Meeting of 25th/26th November accepted the general trust of the Workshop outcomes, but like so many other times, the tabling in Parliament on 29th November of the Opie Report overtook those resolutions.

The Inquiry specifically exonerated Ju Ping Tian and cleared the Gymnastic Program of the Australian Institute of Sport and its staff of any inappropriate practices, from its inception back in 1981 to April 1995. The Federation's media statement stated:-

"The AGF has always maintained that the complaints which prompted the inquiry were isolated incidents that had subsequently been dealt with or

were simply mischievous, to draw attention to Federal funding."

The Inquiry dealt with over 160 submissions on the allegations, all of which were basically dismissed and those accepted had already been dealt with. Opie went on to state that the Federation had failed to communicate and or sell its policies. This was a natural conclusion but no necessarily so. Certain parties refused to accept properly taken decisions and

through parent representatives initiated the Inquiry by Senator Faulkner.

From any situation there are positive outcomes and the Opie Inquiry is no exception. The Federation will review all its relevant policies and Coaches Ethics Code as they apply to all High Performance Centres and elite programs. There is however a down side and cost to the Federation not only the actual expense that will be borne by the Federation, but the cost to our sport in its credibility

and relationship with the Australian Sports Commission.

Because of the importance of the Inquiry a Special Board Meeting was called to quickly respond to its recommendations.

Jim Fergusson the Executive Director of the ASC was in attendance and briefed the Board on the ASC's position which was to have gymnastics "get its house in order", support the WAG Elite National Plan and the National Coach, perform at Atlanta or face the consequences of diminished funding for the next Olympiad.

This ultimatum was confirmed in writing on the 8th December, 1995. The ASC Board at its Meeting of 14th December re-affirmed the above also in writing on 21st December, so that it left no doubt in the minds of anyone in our Federation.

Subsequent meetings were held by the Vice President and National Executive Director with ASC officials, whilst the WAG Elite Planning Committee reviewed the Elite Plan in light of the above.

The position is now quite clear and we only have one direction in which to go if we want success for our WAG Elite Program. The identified weaknesses in our previous approach is that the Federation did not effectively communicate with the parents of National Squad Members.

This will not be the case in the future when the Federation will make direct contact and avoid any misinformation.

It is very important for all of us to understand the cost of the issue in its various ways, learn the lessons well and let our WAG Technical people guide us again to the successful position we know we can attain.

Atlanta will be our major test and we wish our team the very best of success.



FOXTEL CHALLENGE

*Australia vs Japan in Unique
One-On-One International Clash
Sydney, 17th March, 1996*

Australia and Japan clashed in the Foxtel Challenge at the Australian Gymnastic Championships in Sydney on March 17th, 1996 launching a new format of gymnastic competition.

The Australian Women's Artistic Gymnasts after the Australian Championships competed against four of Japan's top gymnasts in a unique one-on-one challenge over the competition floor.

The gymnasts were split into two groups of two gymnasts from each country and rotated through two apparatus before moving to the next apparatus.

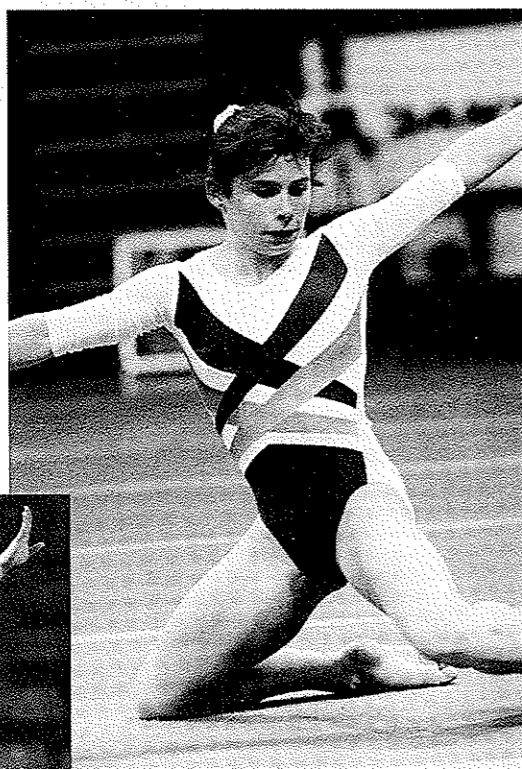
In a normal gymnastic competition, all four apparatus is used simultaneously, with each nation competing together as a team.

The four Japanese gymnasts who competed in the Challenge were Yuki Ohhata, Eri Okumoto, Nozomi Matsumoto and Akiko Kawai. All four Japanese girls have excellent records in junior all-around competition with Kawai being something of a vault specialist.

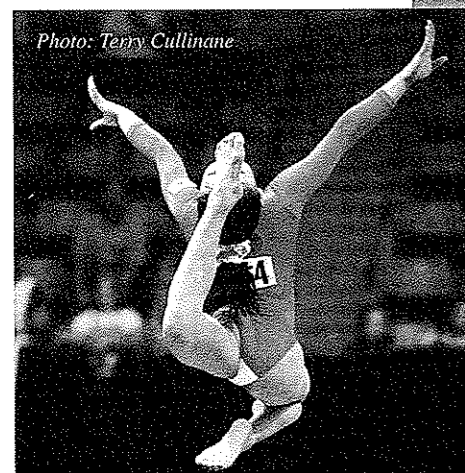
Coached by Noriko Okazaki from the Higashi Osaka Club, the Japanese girls are believed to be an important part of Japan's gymnastic plans for the 2000 Olympic Games.

The girls who were chosen to represent Australia in the Foxtel Challenge were Jo Hughes, Jade Davidson, Nicole Kantek, Ruth Moniz, Rebecca Wilson and Zeena McLaughlin.

Australia won the team event and Nicole Kantek was the overall Foxtel Champion.

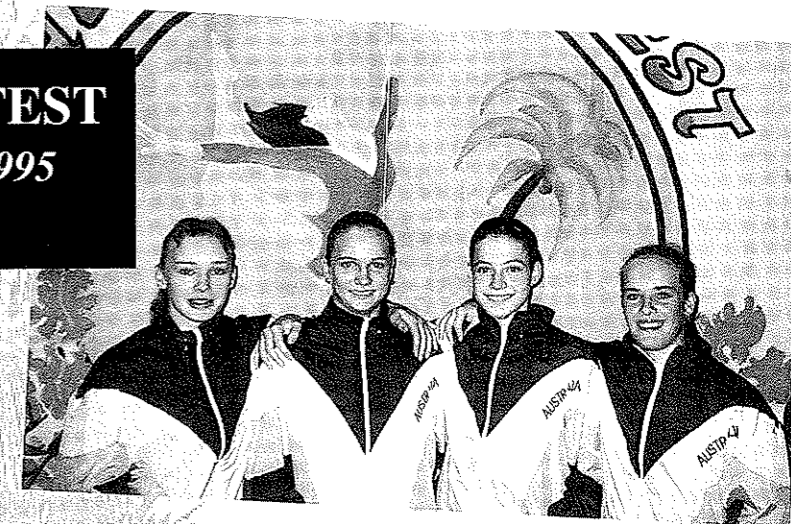

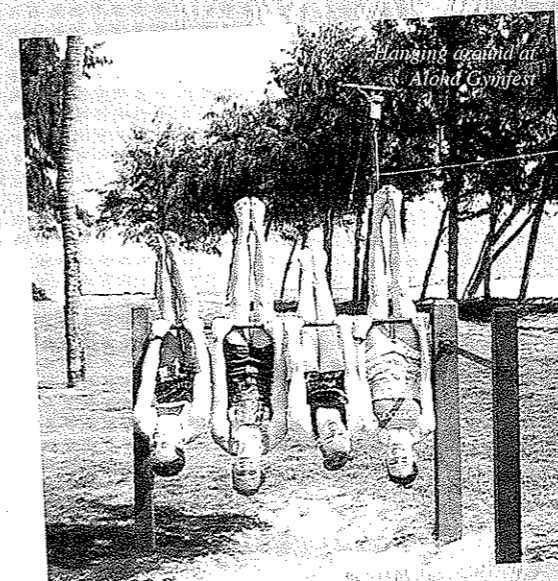

Sydney Hosts Biggest Ever Australian Championships!

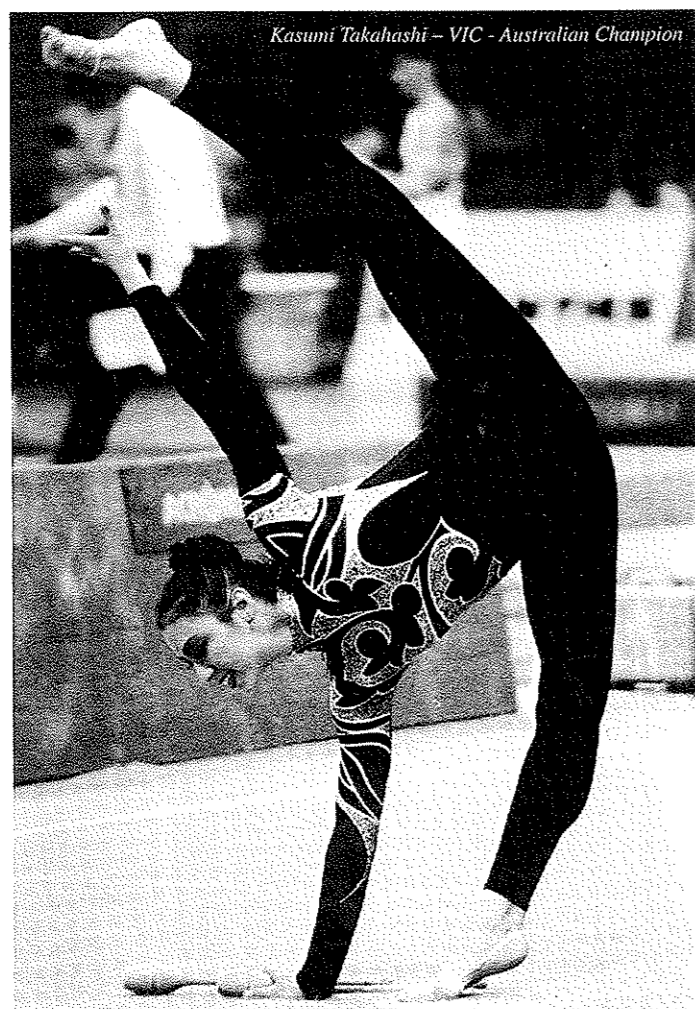
Australia's top gymnasts vying for a ticket to Atlanta, the participation of Australian Commonwealth Games rhythmic gymnastics star Kasumi Takahashi and feature appearances by the spectacular Japanese Men's Rhythmic Display Team, were highlights of the Australian Gymnastic Championships in Sydney.

Interest in the Championships was boosted by Australia preparing to send representatives in all three disciplines to the Atlanta Olympic Games - seven gymnasts in women's artistic gymnastics (WAG), two in men's artistic gymnastics (MAG) and Kasumi Takahashi has personally qualified in rhythmic sportive gymnastics (RSG).

The Championships was the first major event this year in the Olympic selection process for both WAG and MAG, and the scores attained in the compulsory and optional routines will be a pointer to Australia's hopes.

The defending Australian Champions in all three disciplines, WAG Champion Nicole Kantek from NSW, MAG Champion Andrei

Kravtsov from QLD and RSG Champion Leigh Marning from NSW all defended their titles over the five days of competition, with Kravtsov and Kantek putting in repeat

performances and Kasumi Takahashi taking her first Australian Championship.

In WAG, Kantek was pressured by NSW State teammates Ruth Moniz and Kirsty-Leigh Brown, WA's Jenny Smith, Victoria's Joanna Hughes and

Lisa Moro, SA's Rebecca Stoyel, ACT's Genevieve Preston and QLD's Lisa Skinner.

In MAG, Kravtsov had to fend off veterans Brennon Dowrick from ACT and Peter Hogan and Bret Hudson from NSW, who did not compete on all apparatus.

International entries included WAG and MAG gymnasts from New Zealand and RSG gymnasts from Malaysia. Japanese WAG gymnasts competed unofficially on the Saturday night during the All-Around final as a warm-up for their encounter with the Australians on Sunday afternoon in the Foxtel Challenge.

An entertaining addition to the Championship program was the regular performances by the sensational Japanese Men's Rhythmic Display Team who performed 30 minutes prior to the start of the night sessions. The audience was enthralled with their performances.

Women's Artistic Gymnastics

For Ruth Moniz and Jo Hughes it would be their first Olympics after Moniz, as a youngster in the ranks of such illustrious older gymnasts as Monique Allen and Kylie Shadbolt, failed to make the Barcelona team, while Hughes withdrew from selection after developing a painful elbow condition.

Moniz's career seems to be peaking at the right time and if her progression through the Australian Championships can be taken as a guide, she's on track for success; she was 12th in 1991, 8th in 1992, 5th in 1993, missed 1994, and was runner-up last year. She also won two bronze medals at the Commonwealth Games in Canada in 1994.

Hughes, the 1994 Australian champion, has been a force in Australian gymnastics since winning the junior title as well as all apparatus gold medals at the 1990 Championships.

She has never been out of the senior placings at the Australian Championships she has competed in.

Hughes also has the distinction of being the highest world ranked Australian gymnast ever after the 1991 World Championships.

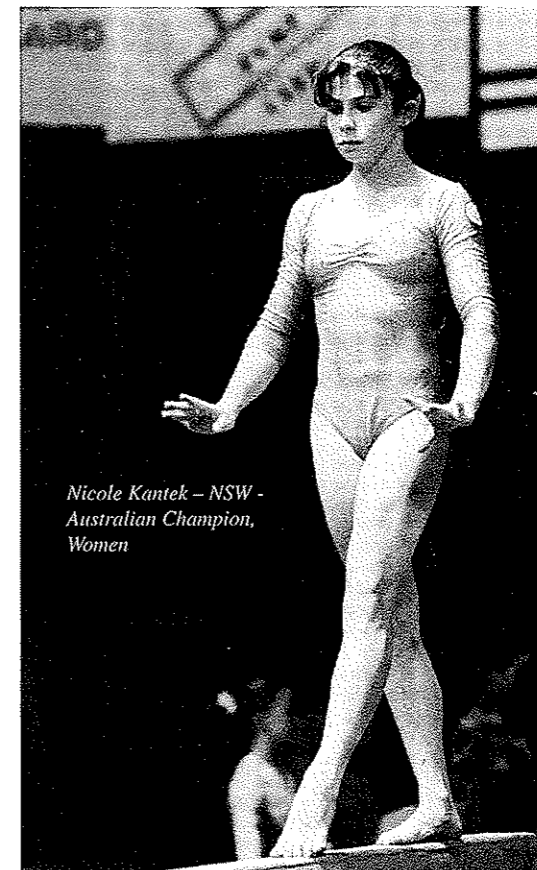
But the 'oldies' won't have it all their own way with Commonwealth

youngsters in the senior ranks looking for Olympic experience before Sydney in 2000 headed by 14 year old defending champion NSW's Nicole Kantek.

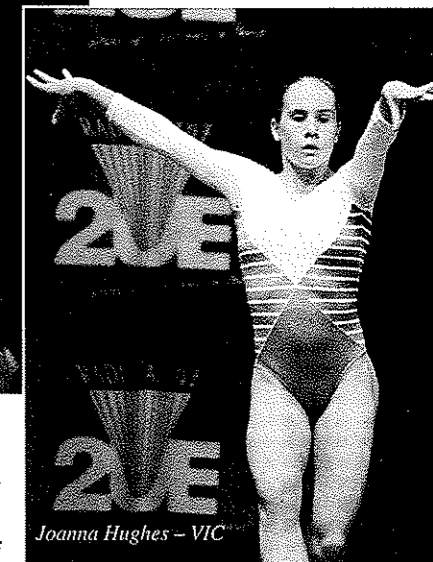
Kantek put in the same steady, consistent performance that saw her steal the title last year from under the noses of the more fancied athletes.

A strong Queensland contingent includes 15 year olds Jade Davidson and Lisa Skinner.



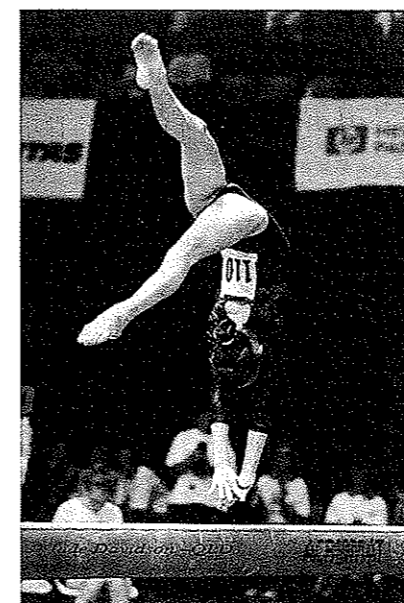

Leigh Marning's biggest hurdle in her quest for a third Australian title was the Australian Commonwealth Games star Kasumi Takahashi who will be contesting her first Australian Championships.

Fifteen year old Takahashi, who won five gold medals in Canada, has already qualified for the Atlanta Olympics after winning every gold medal on offer at the prestigious Four Continents

Championship in Egypt this year, and proved her winning ways by adding an Australian title to her already impressive trophy shelf.

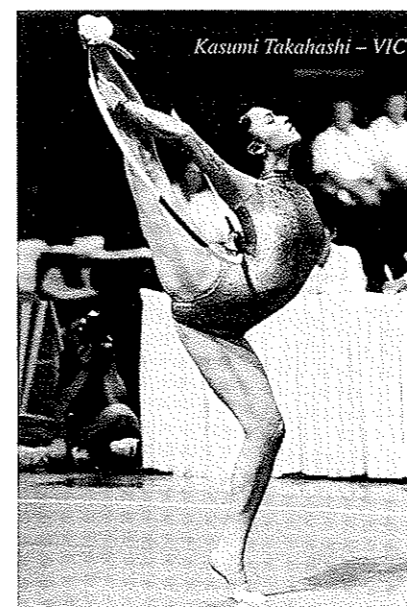
Marning and Takahashi, along with NSW's Katie Mitchell also won the team silver medal at the Commonwealth Games.

The discipline has enjoyed a huge resurgence in popularity

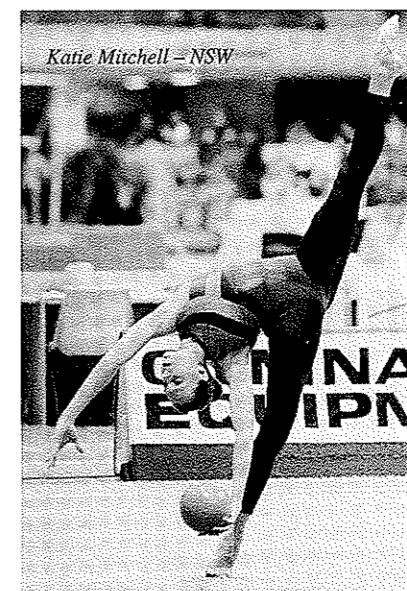
among both participants and spectators in recent years, driven by Australia's improving world standard and Kasumi Takahashi's stunning Commonwealth Games result.

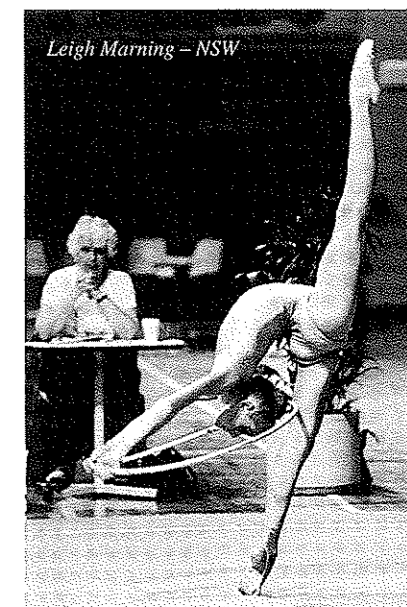
At the end of a tight competition and a disastrous club routine for Marning, Takahashi had the gold, Katie Mitchell the silver and Kristy Darrah, the bronze.

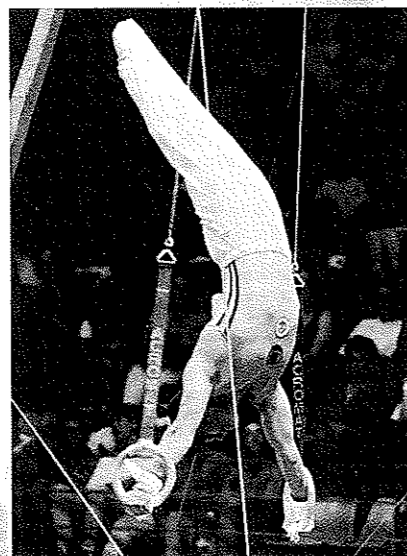


Men's Artistic Gymnastics

Veteran Australian gymnast Brennon Dowrick added a second Olympic Games to his outstanding career record when he competes in the Australian Gymnastic Championships in Sydney next week.

Dowrick, 24, from ACT was Australian Champion in 1991 and 1992, and represented Australia at the Barcelona Olympics in 1992 as well as the Commonwealth Games in 1990 and 1994.

For several years the Senior Australian Men's gymnastic scene has been dominated by Dowrick and fellow veteran Peter Hogan - 1990 Champion, runner up



1991/92/95, Commonwealth Games 1990/94 - but now the pressure is on from a new generation of exciting young gymnasts.

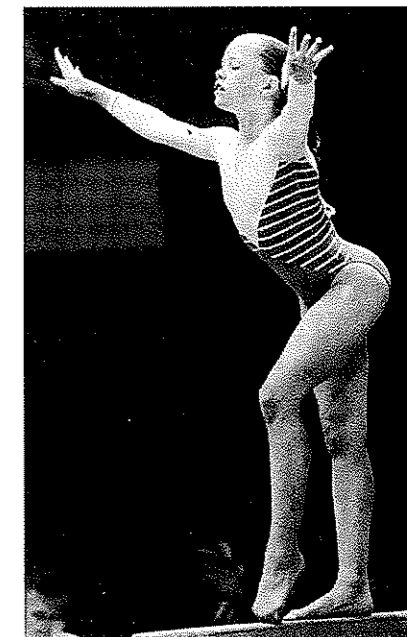
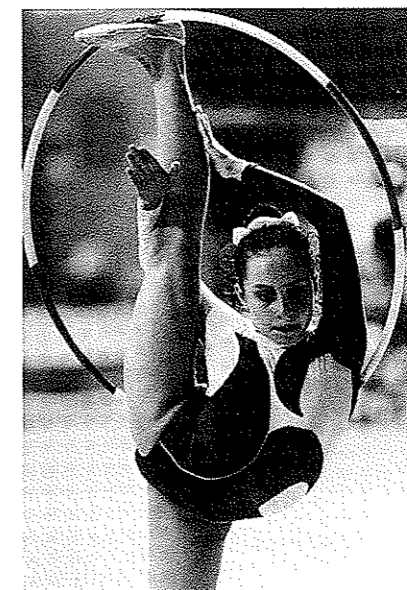
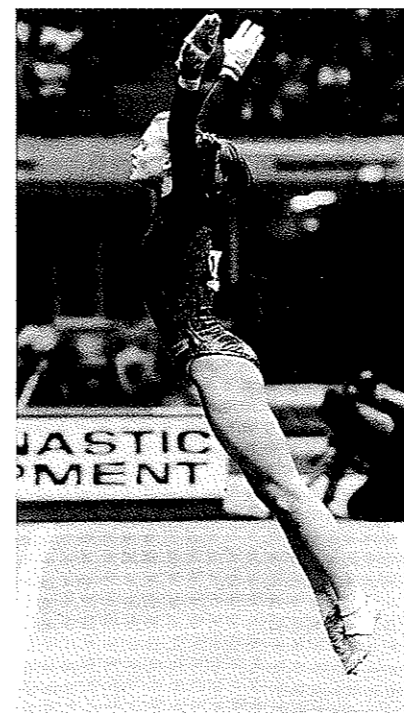
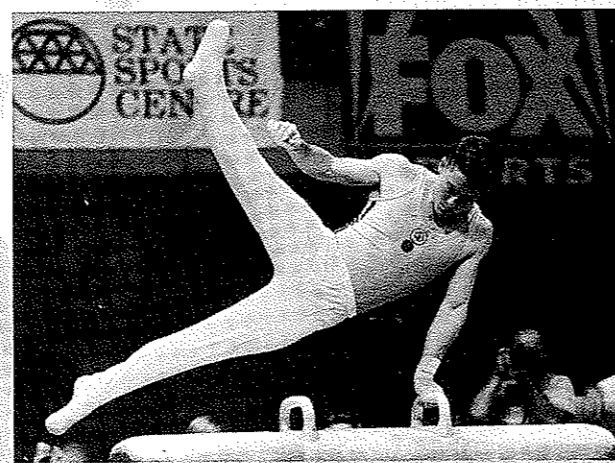
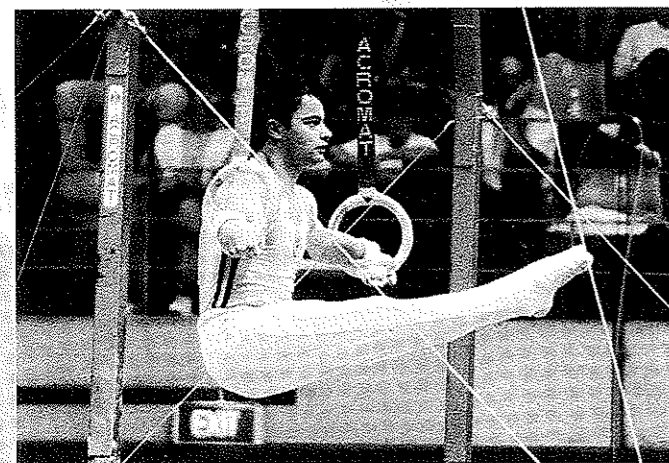
But last year, the title went to sensational 24 year old newcomer Andrei Kravtsov from Queensland who was runner up in 1994. And, he confirmed his title in 1996.

Kravtsov was naturalised earlier this year, and now looks forward eagerly to representing his new country at the Olympic Games in Atlanta.

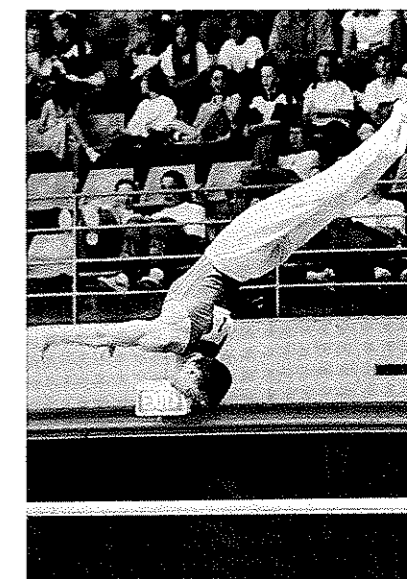
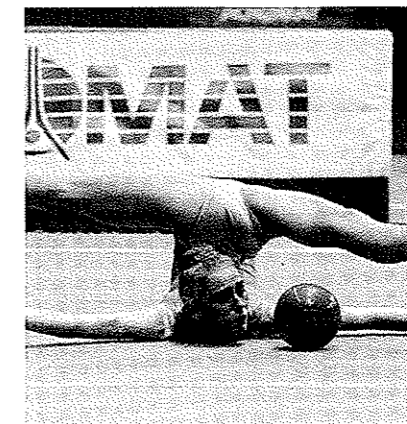
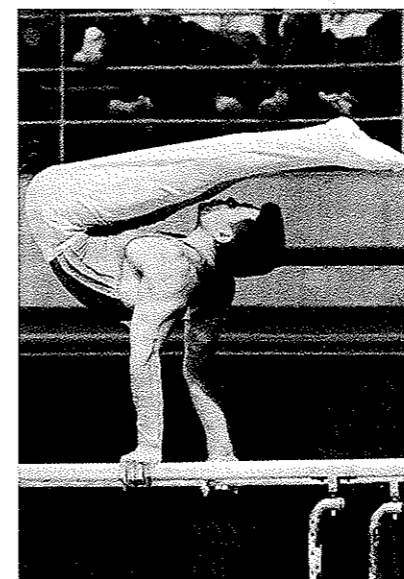
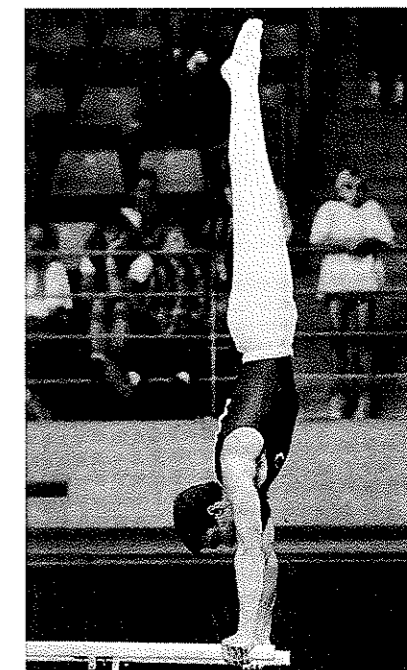
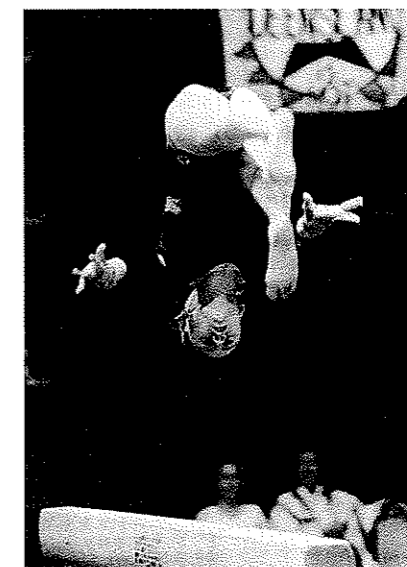
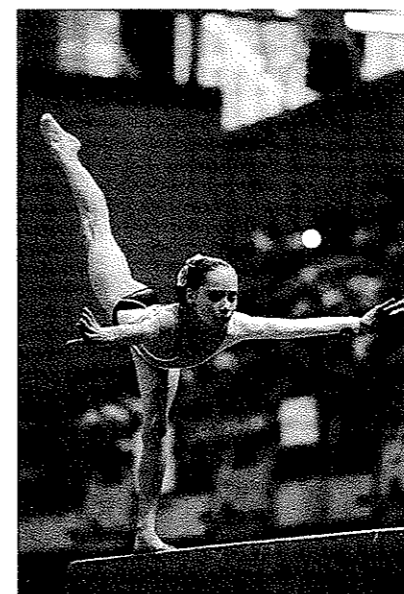

**1st FIG Sport Aerobics
World Championships**
Paris, France
16th/17th December, 1995

Congratulations to our Sport Aerobics colleagues on a very successful outcome to the first FIG World Championships. An historic event in itself.

The full team including support staff and supporters were as follows:

Convention for fitness aerobics was also successfully conducted.

In terms of participation this was the largest number of Federations ever to compete internationally. The only aerobic depower not competing was the USA and that was because of an entry oversight, however Kathy Scanlan, USA Gymnastics President and CEO, and Howard Schwartz, President of National Aerobics Championships Worldwide, were there to support the Championships. The Secretary General of the International Aerobics Federation was also present to give his organisation imprimatur to the Championships.

19 of 19, but had a music foul up, being not loud enough and slow. Their professionalism stood out and they qualified sixth. In the finals they had it all sorted out and improved one place to fifth. Finals in Sport Aerobics are seeded with the lowest qualifier staring, so it is difficult to improve your position.

Our individual male, Todd Butland did not go to Paris for personal reasons, but the writer is of the impression that he would have qualified for the Finals too. Mario Luis Americo of Brazil not only won the event but twas the outstanding athlete of the Championships.

Our trio of Juanita Little, Dean Wright and Michael Betts also overcame adversity, in possibly the toughest competition of the Championships and were rewarded with a seventh place in the finals.

As we did not select a Trio at the Australian Championships it was decided to form a combination from the best individual finishers of those Championships and it turned out to be a great success, particularly when they only had 5-6 weeks to get their 'act' together. The draw was kind again 14 of 21. However we qualified equal ninth with Russia. Disappointment. When the Start List came out Australia was to start! Surprise, the reason was that the second Brazil Trio was eliminated. Next morning, despair as Russia had the highest Execution score and therefore replaced us.

During the interval between finals we found out that the Russian Trio was not in the stadium, so Australia warmed up with the "nail biting" wait to compete. Not only did they compete, but they also improved one place to finish 7th!

So it was a fantastic result, but the "icing on the cake" was still to

The standard of the competition was excellent and the Australian results outstanding with all of the Team making finals. In order of competition they alternated Individual Women and Mixed Pairs in the first half and Individual men and Trios in the second half. Using two judging panels this made for an efficient and interesting program over two days. Qualification on the first day and finals with eight finalists on the second day.

Patsy Tierney had an excellent draw 27 of 29 starters and qualified in an impressive third place.

She continued in impressive style in the finals to obtain a Silver Medal. How historic, 1st World Championships, 1st event and for the Federation our first World Championships medal. Well done Patsy.

Our pair of Sonia Shepherd and Eddie Walton also had a good draw,

The French Gymnastic Federation organised the event under extremely difficult economic circumstances, including a general strike by all transport in Paris! To their credit all Delegations praised their endeavours. The stadium "Pierre de Coubitan" was ideal with an adjacent training hall, back stage warm-up and an excellent stage arrangement with a quality sprung floor. A video wall for replays and an excellent sound system enhanced the presentation of the event. Opposite the training hall a

come. All finalists received the much coveted FIG Gold Pin. Under FIG rules all athletes who attain 90% of the possible marks at World Championships or Olympic Games are accorded this honour. For Sport Aerobics the criteria, because of open ended scores, is "All Finalists".

So the Team achieved outstanding success under somewhat difficult circumstances. We lost our Technical Director and International Judge Sylvia Kelly to illness and Peggy Browne also could not travel because of pressure

of work, so Annette Chatterton took on the extra workload. Unfortunately she was not allowed to Judge, because she does not hold a FIG Brevet, which was a further disadvantage to Australia.

All of the Gymnastics congratulates Annette and her support team, especially our two masseurs who funded themselves to Paris, which reminds us of some other medical support personnel. They provided wonderful support to our athletes.

The future for Sport Aerobics looks bright. We await the

formalisation of Sport Aerobics as a discipline of the FIG at the Atlanta Congress. This will be followed by the Second FIG World Championships in The Hague, Holland in October 1996. The 2nd Intercontinental Judges Course for the next Olympiad will be held before the end of 1996 and then Australia will have the privilege of hosting the 3rd FIG World Championships in Perth in May of 1997.

Canberra Cup International Junior Event

After a great deal of effort securing adequate sponsorship to ensure that this Canberra Cup International Junior Event went ahead, the Australian Sports Commission and the ACT Department of Sport, Recreation and Racing contributed funds to ensure that a small but high class event could be conducted in 1995.

China participated with two of its leading junior male gymnasts and two junior female gymnasts.

Japan also arrived with outstanding junior male and female gymnasts. The USA was represented by a highly qualified female gymnast and Great Britain sent two of its up and coming female gymnasts to this inaugural event. Although the field of gymnasts was small, the standard of competition was outstanding and it provided the audience with some insight into future world stars in gymnastics.

For the Australian gymnasts, who were represented by eight females and eight males, it was an ideal opportunity to culminate the year on a high note. The Australian men, David Schneider, Justin Ng, Richard Peverell, Dion McNamara, Adrian Looney, Justin Beaton, Phillippe Rizzo and Wade Peterson performed credibly, although it was clear that more experience was

required to be able to challenge our overseas competitors. The Canberra Cup offers just the experience that these young gymnasts require and to inspire them to achieve their goals. It is clear that Australia is not far behind the top Asian nations.

The Australian women, represented by Alyssa Harvey, Katarina Frketic, Melissa Laws, Jade Davidson, Bree Munro, Brooke Walker, Rebecca Wilson

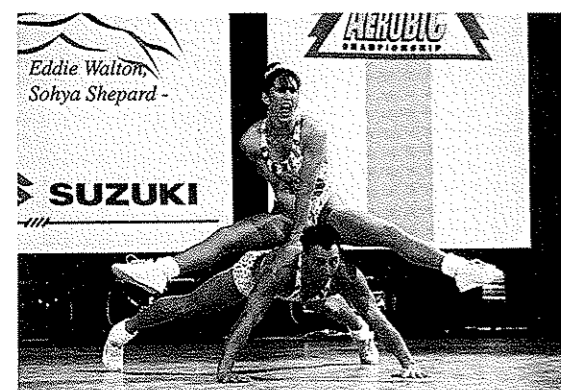

Australia had two gymnasts in each final, who were selected

from all of the eight gymnasts participating in the all-around competition. The young Justin Beaton was able to compete in his first international apparatus finals on the pommel horse, Justin Ng competed on the horizontal bar while Phillippe Rizzo was able to secure a berth in the vault final. The more experienced team members of Dion McNamara, Richard Peverell and David Schneider competed in a number of finals to secure some good scores. David Schneider also finished in third place on the



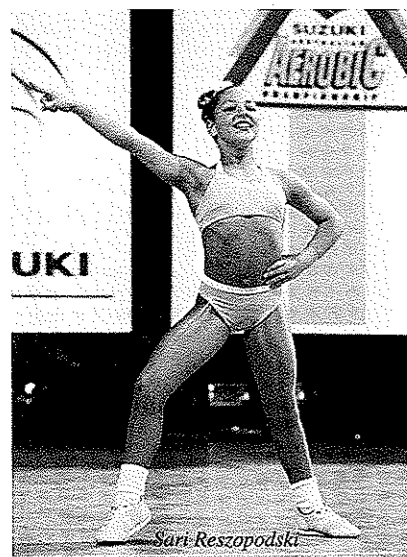
and Rebecca Armbruster also competed with great expertise. Their opposition was truly magnificent and the young Chinese gymnast Bi Wen Jing completed an amazing seven leap and acrobatic elements in succession on the beam. 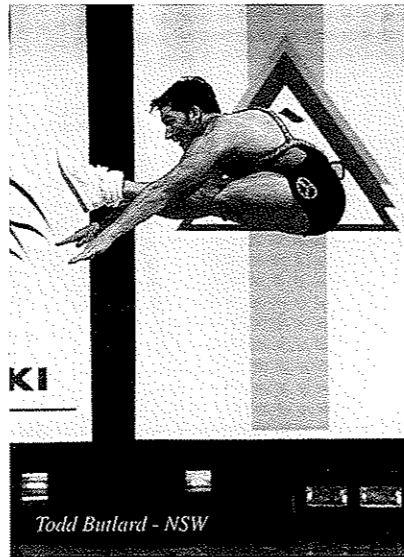

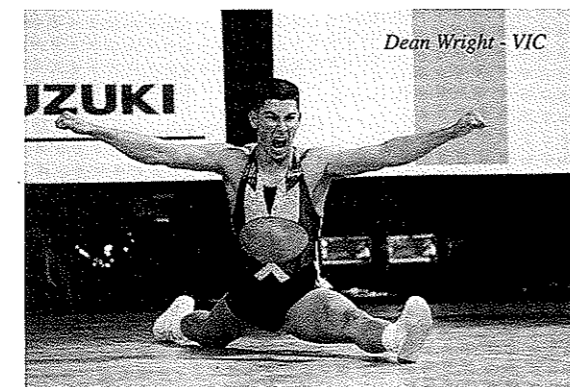

Scallywaggs was started by Kit Poole and husband Rod, who together, have searched the globe for new and innovative equipment ideas and teaching resources.

Scallywaggs offers gymnastic programs for children from 10 months (New Walkers) to 10 years (Junior Gym). All classes are based on the Kindergym, Gym Fun and Gym Skills programs, which allow children to learn skills in a progressive style while still having fun.

Both Kit and Rod believe that ALL children, regardless of shape, size or ability should have the opportunity to enjoy gymnastics without the pressure to compete. Any child who shows potential and wishes to compete is given an introduction to the local competitive club.

Scallywaggs relies very heavily on a people centred approach, in all aspects of club operation. The following are some examples:

- Parents are kept informed by monthly newsletters and encouraged to express their ideas on improvements to the gym, favourite music or new class times.
- Staff profiles are displayed at the entrance to the gym to answer any questions new parents may have regarding qualifications.

came throughout the day bringing along friends and relatives to watch.

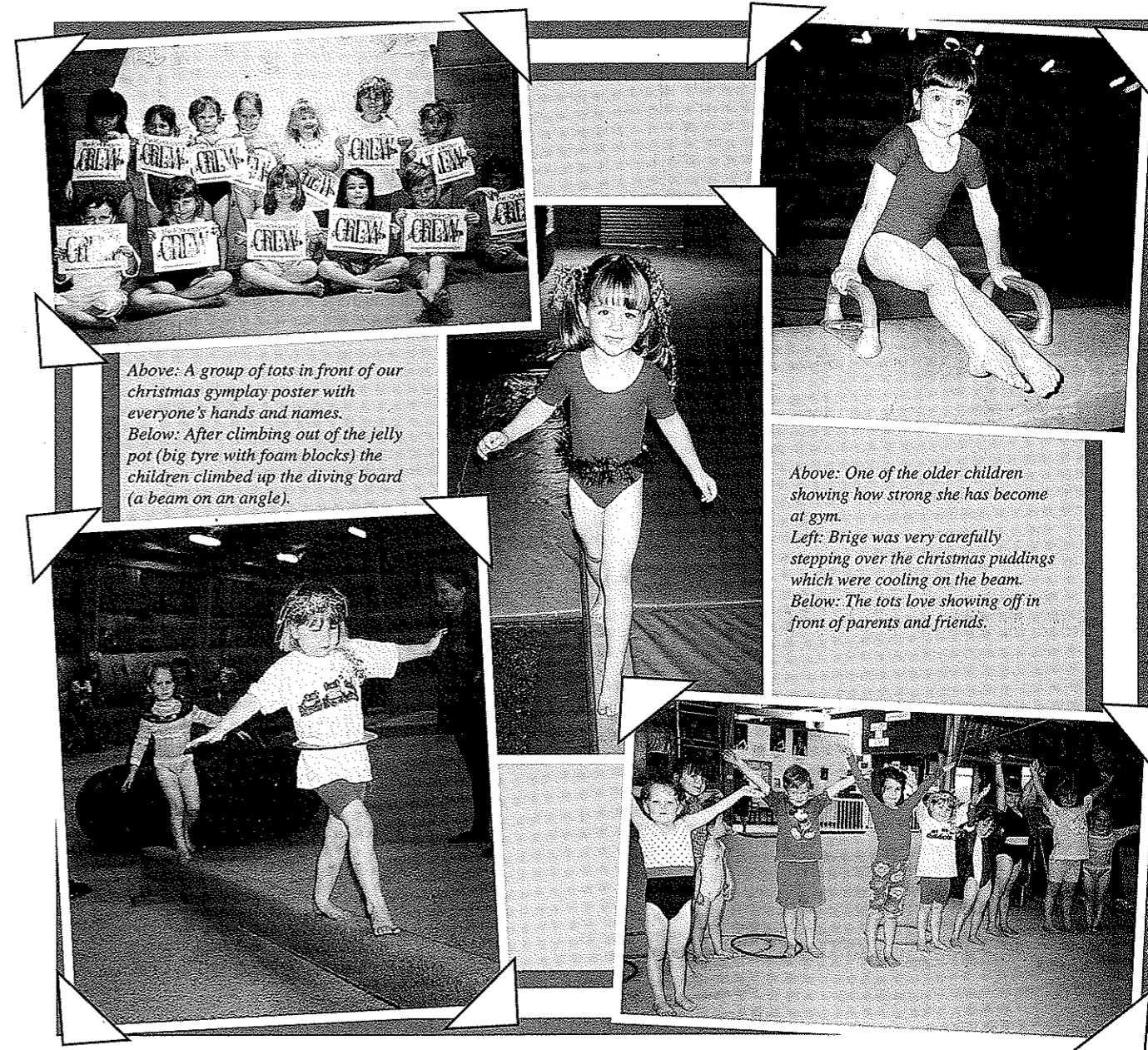

Games.

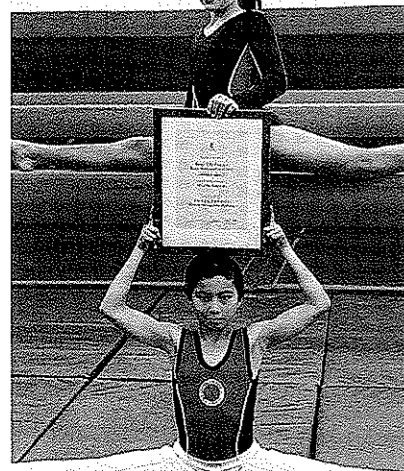
